March 03, 1918

April 04, 1918

Lusk School War Fund

It will be interesting to school patrons to know just what school children have done concerning the war situation. Not counting teachers the children of the city school have invested over eight hundred twenty five dollars in liberty bond, red cross material and war saving stamps. This means over two dollars per pupil; if we count the bond and Red Cross money it will average over four dollars per pupil. Counting teachers' investments raises the fund to one thousand three hundred seventy five dollars. Two hundred twenty towels have been made for the Red Cross and thirty dollars worth of material remains to be worked up into aprons, but owing to the time lost on account of epidemics this year it is not advisable to take time from the regular school work for this purpose and so what is done this year must be carried on outside of the regular school classes. The entertainment given for the Junior Red cross netted over fifty dollars which was invested in materials to be made up for the Red Cross. FUNDS RAISED FOR ARMENIANS AND SYRIANS On account of the great world war the Armenians and Syrians have been left in a deplorable condition, their homes wrecked and farms divested, families have been deported and in a great many instances fathers and mothers have been torn away from their children and the little ones are left to shift for themselves, The Armenian and Syrian Relief society has been organized to alleviate the suffering among these people and to assist them in reestablishing homes. Mr. **D. C. Leach** has been appointed to look after the work in this community, he will accept donations to a fund that is being raised and has been recognized by the American Red Cross and Cardinal Gibbons, of Baltimore. Charles D. Carey, chairman of the state committee forwards this telegram to **Mr. Leach** from the American Red Cross.

SEEKING NEW FIELDS Bright and early Monday morning D. C. Leach, Leslie McCarthy and Dr. Roy Leach started for the Red Desert country overland in a search for new and undiscovered oil structures. They will be accompanied by Mrs. D. C. Leach as far as Casper. From that place they will go to Rawlins and then on into Sweetwater county where the Red Desert country is located. While resting from their labors in their labors in hunting oil domes they will fish, for, Mr. Leach says they will pass through an excellent trout fishing country.

August 08, 1919

THOUGHT WELL HAD COME IN On Monday morning a lady living in the east end of the Lusk field telephoned into Realtyman Tooley that she could "hear a roaring sound from in the direction of No. 19 well," and that she "believed it had come in." Mr. Tooley told a friend or two, and it was not long until a string of cars were on the road, (their occupants bent on learning what the noise was about. In one party of two cars were Mr. and Mrs. D. C. Leach, Dr. Roy Leach and wife, Mrs. G. B. Primer and childrcn, Frank Connelly, E. Suver arid Maud Conners of the Lusk hotel. Upon their return Miss Conners called at the Standard office and left the following facts: On No. 19 the driller is now down 2,920 feet, and informed tiic lady every indication of formation passed through is favorable for oil. In the boiler room an extra heavy fire had been put in and when the furnace doors were thrown open to allow the boilers to cool off a heavy ■oaring sound went up through the smokestacks. It was this sound that had been heard, and which had been misunderstood by the lady who had phoned in. The would-be sight-seers enjoyed their ride and no harm was done by the report. Work on No. 19 is being watched with unusual interest.

August 22, 1919

DINNER PARTY AT THE LUSK HOTEL Mrs. Maud Conner gave a dinner party Tuesday night at the Lusk hotel to a party of her friends. The occasion was the completion of the Primmer and Bussey contract on Western States Well No. 19 and Mr. E. B. Primmer and Mr. B. M. Bussey were the guests of honor. October 10, 1919

October 17, 1919

LEACH SAYS WILL HIT OIL IN OSAGE AT 300 FEET D. C. Leach, who has been in the Osage country for the past month, protecting his oil interest against the Sheridan bunch, came in Sunday for a week's visit with

his family. He says he is still holding down claims and will be back on the job next week he reports excellent progress being made on his holdings in sections 8 and 9. Mr. Leach states that here are now drilling on the NW ¼ of the SW ¼ of section 9-46,63, and the structure shows excellent promise. They were down 150 feet last Sunday and expect that, when the well is down 300 it, oil will be gushing up to the top.

October 17, 1919

LUSK MEAN AMONG THE FIRST TO LOCATE IN NEW OSAGE FIELD Newcastle, Wyoming. The next oil movement of any extent in the state of Wyoming will center at Newcastle. I was over the Osage district with Gray Whipple of Lusk. In fact, in all the different sections about Newcastle to the south and southwest as well as northwest in the Osage district, the residents of Lusk predominate among the early bird locator who have their names at the discovery shafts, and when the big shuffle is over the Lusk hustlers will be found carrying home their share of the division. Lusk geologists, Lusk prospectors and Lusk drillers are in majority evidence in all the hotels, garages and restaurants, and at nearly every rig visited men from Lusk were in charge of the drills. While the people of Newcastle are just beginning to realize what the oil movement in Eastern Wyoming may mean for their little town, the spirit of Lusk has been in operation there and in the surrounding country for the past six months, and none of the residents of Newcastle are wondering how it happens that the oil structures are to a great extent in the hands of Lusk people instead of their own. After oil was struck in the Mike Henry well on Sec. 5, there was a rush for land in the neighborhood, and the people of Newcastle butted up against solid blocks of locations that had been quietly made during the past spring and summer. Whipple's was scattered over a big scope of country, and Lucky Baldwin had crowded around in a lot of likely looking places. It will be remembered Ray Whipple used to disappear from Lusk between two-day last spring and summer, leaving no trace of himself and his car for a month at a time. When daylight came he was a hundred miles to the northwest and proximity with other prospectors and geologists from the Lusk field who were studying out the dome and structural formation of the big field then have since located. While gratifying to these men the discovery of oil in the Mike Henry well came to them as no matter of surprise, as the indication of oil are plainly scattered over a large section of the country. While the Mike Henry well on section 5, T. 46, R. 46, has for the moment brought the Osage district into immediate prominence, it is by no means the most promising section of the field to the north of Lusk. Southward from Newcastle on the Beaver on Sheep creek and on the Cheyenne, geologists have made favorable reports the past few months- some of them giving certain structures a better than fifty-fifty chance for oil. These reports are withheld at the present during consummation of leases and contracts now under course of advisements. Newcastle Mr. Mount, who was one of the first prospectors and locators in the Osage district, and who has an interest in the Mike Henry producer on Sec. 5, informs your correspondent it was a great pleasure to him to see his well brought in- perhaps more because it satisfied himself that his judgement had been correct in believing a good shallow field existed there from a financial standpoint. And this is the consensus of geologists and prospectors who have worked on the structure in this section, that there exist a good shallow field, where many producers may be looked for at depths of less than a thousand

feet. For several days prior to my trip into the Osage field a heavy rain had been coming down steadily and the newly graded county road from Newcastle to the Burlington station at Osage was heavy with mud but the engine in the Whipple car help humming and when we couldn't shoot over we plowed through. About eight miles out from Newcastle we passed the first rig, a Standard belonging to a Sheridan outfit. It stands about a quarter of a mile southwest from the road, and from the movement about the rig they were evidently ready to spud in. About 500 feet east from the Osage station, fifteen miles northwest from Newcastle, Johnson and Howell had spudded in on a well right by the side of the Burlington, on the N.E. corner of SIS. T, 46, R. 65. All the locations in the Osage district mentioned in this article are in T. 46, R. 45. The Johnson Howell outfit dumped their rig of a car at this point and to save freighting erected the derrick where it struck the ground. The field it fortunate in this respect as a few miles at most will be all that is necessary to haul rig and camp equipment and the prospecting of the section will be performed at the minimum of cost. A town unite has been laid out and plotted at Osage Mea may be had at u easting nous already are there and it is a probable that a general store will go in there., that some kind of sleeping quarters will be put up and that a few of the workers in the district may have living quarters there. But the townsite field lies too far from the field of operation to be very greatly populated with the families of the oil workmen. A mile southwest from the station on Sec 16, the Slocum outfit drillers are getting up a rig and preparing to drill another well for the Mike Henry Company. To the southwest a half mile from this rig the Bussey and Leach outfit from Lusk have their living and office quarter erected and their rig is on the ground about ready to spud in. This is one of the pieces of ground located under the oil placers act which was covered by a 320 acre homestead location a few days after oil was brought in the discovery well on 5, and upon the locator's of which an injunction was served to prevent them from drilling on the ground It was located by the homesteader as agricultural ground with affidavits supporting the location. You correspondent drove over a good portion of this ground and in the entire distance failed to discover any soil formation whatever, the entire surface in that neighborhood being a black finely pulverized shale. With blotches of turtlebacks numerously distributed and if there is a 10 footpath of earth on the ground which would raise a medium crop of Russian thistles it escaped my eye. There are several new homestead settlers' cabins relieving the monotony of landscape which have sprouted since oil came into evidence in the neighborhood. Also in the same connection the Hugo- miller outfit- Lusk men with a Lusk company, have had an injunction served upon them to stop drilling. Those men had their rig and camp in readiness to sink their hole and had already spudded in on their first well. This is on the west Ny Co.'s property on Sec. 5, but a short distance south from the discovery well and it is greatly to be hoped that this property with the Bussy- Leach ground may soon be relieved from the embarrassment of this injunction. A half mile southwest from the Bussy-Leach rig on S. 17, is the rig of the Lusk Baldwin outfit, property of the Lusk-Edgemont Co. This rig stands well out in the center of the Osage Structure and at the time we visited the well the drillers were down about 175 feet. Like all the other rigs in the section they had been shut down here during the rains but were getting readiness to begin drilling again. They have one of the best rigs in the district on the ground here and will not be far behind any of the outfits that now preparing to drill in reaching the sand. This work is being pushed by another Lusk outfit with Baldwin at its head. At "Lucky" Baldwin camp Mrs. Hohs of Carper was in charge

of the living quarters and the drillers were evidently comfortable situated on the N.E. corner of Sec. 19, a Mr. Adams is in charge of a rig. 1 did from the blind pool rig the Mike-Henry Co. are drilling their second well a quarter of a mile SW from the discovery. They are down 600 feet on their well and are expected big things when the sand is reached here. Quite a little village of cabins has already been put up at this camp and on all the rigs they were busy either drilling or preparing to sound in "From this different directions yellow piles of lumber were discernable a half mile or a mile away dotting the dark background of the sage along the gradual slopes and there were several truckloads of rig material moving to the points of location where drilling will soon be in operation. The general escarpment or outcrop in this section is in what is known as the greenhorn lime, the depth from this formation to the sands being 600 to 700 feet in Eastern Wyoming and as there will be many wells down on the sands before freeze up the section will probably be pretty well prospected this fall and early winter. This matter of the homesteads being filed over the placer location will undoubtedly delay a good deal of the drilling that would otherwise be progressing now but it is not felt among the best posted operators that the work will be more temporally retarded. The outlook is altogether to be considered favorable in the Osage field for a number of shallow producers to be added to the Western Wyoming field this winter. Sixteen miles directly south of Newcastle the site of the old and well known Mead ranch is also about to become the scene of active oil operations. Mr. Mead whom the ranch is named after, Charles Carlson of the First National Bank of Lusk and McKcon, the well-known eastern Wyoming cattle man, together with a number of associates have secured the state and school lands in the district and these together with lands they already owned and have secured under the placer laws, have been pooled with the idea of prospecting them, Prof. George, Colorado geologist spent twenty-eight days recently in examining these lands and the pool and beginning of operation are the result of his report and maps on the District. The Midwest Co. have taken over a bulk of the leases in this pool and are preparing to begin work at once. They have already unloaded a Standard Rig outfit with a number of trucks and camp equipment at the Mead ranch and will begin construction of the derrick and quarters at once. The first well will be drilled either on section 35 or 36 adjoining the ranch the exact location not having yet been determined upon. Ten miles southeast from the Meads ranch in township 40, range 64 on Sheep creek the geologists have also made a favorable report this fall and an outfit thought to be the Ohio are making preparation to drill. A new company, the Coyote Oil Lands Inc., is a concern recently organized at Edgemont, which has under control some of the choice lands of the eastern part of the state. The officers and directors of this company are: George M Ashton: secretary JL Dugan; treasurer, Richard Pfister. They have royalty interests in practically the whole of the Snyder dome on townships 10 and 11 and begin operations under the most favorable auspices. Their holding are in what is known as the Coyote Draw country, a section which they have every reason to believe will equal the mule creek country. The Carlson ranch also on this Snyder dome will be drilled. The Baker Petroleum company are now drilling in the draw with a hole down a little more than a 1000 foot. Also Norbeck and Nicholson who drilled on the Old Woman have a rig at work on this dome; Mr. Rheinhard the potash man from eastern Nebraska has leased extensively for the Coyote Co., and a company from Utah are now putting in four standard rigs to operate on lands they have leased there in western South Dakota as in the extreme eastern portion of

Wyoming the people are just awakening to the possibilities the "oil movement may mean to their respective localities. In Hot Springs, there are a few men who have been alive to the situation for many months and who are now holding interest in different localities but for the most part its residents look at the operation as a game in which the players might stand some chance in _Wyoming, Alaska some other state but never at their own doors. In all the section, I have been through Lusk is looked upon as the headquarters for oil operation in this country and with the education she has had and the with the reaching out disposition she is showing it is probable Lusk will remain the center of the 611 movement for eastern Wyoming and western South Dakota.

Last week, when the drill was down 150 feet, Mr. Leach made the prediction that oil would be hit at 300 feet which evidences that a fairly accurate knowledge of the field is possible by those familiar with it.
